49th State 4-H Horse Show Schedule and Information

Attached ([pages 19-21](#)) is a revised schedule of classes for the State Show, being held July 23-July 30 in Abilene. **Some changes have been made from previous years, and 4-H'ers should look closely at days and times for various classes.** No late entries will be accepted, and the **deadline for entries is July 1st.** Those 4-H'ers who don't attend District and don't make their State entries in the open divisions, will need to be sure and make Open Division(s) entries on an official entry form. Those forms must be sent to the District office first. They will then be forwarded on to the State Horse Specialists' office. CEA's, contact your District office now

to get copies of the State 4-H Horse Show entry form, contestant's letter and other information. Each district office received a revised entry form and contestant's letter in the District and State 4-H Horse Show Support Packet. The **Horse Show Contestant's Letter contains valuable information for 4-H families, as they prepare for and attend the State 4-H Horse Show.** In accordance with Texas Animal Health Commission regulations, all horses entering the Taylor County Expo grounds in Abilene must be accompanied by proof of negative EIA status. The EIA documentation papers are good for 12 months from the date of issue.

This packet was developed and sent to all 12 District Extension Offices. It includes guidelines for conducting a successful District 4-H Horse Show with information on a class-by-class basis. Many CEAs serve on District 4-H Horse Show Management Teams, and it is hoped that this information is helpful for running those classes at the shows.

The packet also includes information on the **49th Texas State 4-H Horse Show**, including a Contestant's Letter and the entry information. All entries must be processed through the District offices prior to being sent to the

Horse Specialists' offices. It is very important for all State 4-H Horse Show exhibitors to receive a Contestant's Letter prior to departing for Abilene, Texas, for the State Show. Contact your District Extension office relative to these materials. Contact the Horse Specialist, Dennis Sigler, at dsigler@tamu.edu or Program Specialist, Teri Antilley, at tjantilley@ag.tamu.edu if you have any questions about the 49th Texas State 4-H Horse Show. The show is July 23-July 30 at the Taylor County Expo Center in Abilene. To be eligible for the Qualifying Divisions, 4-Hers must

show at the District show in at least one class in the division(s) they want to show in at the State Show. For the Open Division, 4-Hers do not have to qualify but must be bonafide 4-H members with horses certified through the County Extension office on or before May 1.

Qualifying for State via District 4-H Horse Shows

For many years, 4-Hers have had to enter Qualifying classes and earn one or more points, in order to show in the Qualifying Division at the State 4-H Horse Show. The 2011 District shows will all offer a more balanced set of Qualifying classes, and a 4-Her must simply **show in at least one class within a division, in order to qualify for all the classes in that division** at the State 4-H Horse Show. **They do not have to earn one or more points.**

For well over 40 years, a 4-Her could only show one horse at the District show in the Qualifying Division. However, numerous horses could be shown in the Open category. 4-Hers may show **one horse in each Division** at District Horse Shows, or the same horse in all divisions, provided any/all horse(s) were validated as projects by May 1.

While most 4-Hers will continue to show only one horse, often in two or three divisions,

these changes now allow a 4-Her to show a separate horse in halter, in western judged, in hunter-flat, and in speed events. They can **only show one horse in each Qualifying Division**. Since the futurity classes involve yearlings, two-year-olds, or three-year-old horses, each futurity class is listed as a division, in order to make it simpler for District 4-H Horse Show Management Teams to track.

District Horse Shows Offer 22 Classes in Qualifying Division

Each District will offer the following 22 classes in Divisions that make up the Qualifying Category at all 2011 shows. A 4-Her must show in at least one class in each Division, in order to 'qualify' for all the classes in that division at the State 4-H Horse Show. A futurity project horse must be shown at District, in order to 'qualify' for a futurity class at the State Show.

Halter Division (1 horse per 4-Her) Registered Four-Year-Old & Younger Geldings, Registered Five-Year-Old & Older Geldings, Grade Geldings, Grand & Reserve Champion Gelding, Registered Four-Year-Old & Younger Mares, Registered Five-Year-Old & Older Mares, Grade Mares, and Grand & Reserve Champion Mare. These halter classes have always been held at all District Shows. The only change regarding halter classes is that they are now in a Division, and a 4-Her

may show a halter horse only. In other words, it does not have to be the same horse that is shown in a performance class, but it could be the same horse. These classes will be held at all 12 District 4-H Horse Shows.

Judged Western Division (1 horse per 4-Her) - Showmanship, Western Pleasure, Western Horsemanship, Western Riding, and Trail. These classes will be held at all 12 District 4-H Horse Shows.

Speed Events Division (1 horse per 4-Her) - Barrels, Poles, and Stakes. These classes will be held at all 12 District 4-H Horse Shows. A 4-Her who shows a horse in some other division can also show a speed horse.

Hunter-Flat Division (1 horse per 4-Her) - Hunter Showmanship, Hunter Under Saddle, and Hunt Seat Equitation. These classes will be held at all 12 District 4-H Horse Shows. In many

cases, 4-Hers will show the same horse here as they do in the western classes, but they don't have to.

Yearling Halter Gelding Futurity Division (1 horse per 4-Her)

Yearling Halter Filly Futurity Division (1 horse per 4-Her)

Yearling Longe Line Futurity Division (1 horse per 4-Her)

2-Year-Old Futurity Division (1 horse per 4-Her)

3-Year-Old Futurity Division (1 horse per 4-Her)

All futurity project horses must be shown at District to be eligible for State. Futurity Division classes will be held at all 12 District 4-H Horse Shows. **(Note: 3-Year-Old Futurity Working Cow Horse is optional at the District Show, depending upon cattle availability.)**

Futurity Projects Must be Shown at District in Order to Show at State

The 4-H Futurity Program has been in existence for many years. Again for 2011, all District

4-H Horse Shows will offer the yearling, 2-year-old, and 3-year-old futurity divisions. A 4-Her

MUST show their Futurity Project at District, in order to enter State in the Futurity Division.

The 4-H Roping School Committee and the Texas AgriLife Extension - Hockley County are sponsoring the 22nd Annual 4-H Team Roping School at South Plains College in Levelland. This school will be directed at the development of roping and horsemanship skills of youngsters 12 years old to 18 years (as of August 31, 2010). **Participation is open to all districts of the state.** The school will be held June 23-26, 2011 and application forms are enclosed.

The cost of the school will be \$300.00 per student plus a \$25.00 stall deposit. This includes meals from Thursday evening through Sunday at breakfast, 3 nights lodging, stall rent, instruction, insurance, a cattle charge and refreshments. The \$25.00 stall deposit will be refunded at the end of the school if your stall and tack room are clean and pass inspection. The school will be limited to 30 participants on a first-come, first-served basis. There must be a minimum of 15 participants for the school to be held. Participants submitting applications after the school is full will be put on the alternate list and will have their deposits refunded in full if a slot does not open up in the school. We had a full camp last year and turned a few applications down, so please get applications in early.

A \$100.00 deposit must be received with the completed application by May 31, 2011, to confirm a reservation. The \$200.00 balance and stall deposit will be due upon arrival. Please make a separate check for the \$25.00 deposit. Check-in time will be from 2:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 23rd at South Plains College campus (building location will be provided in the confirmation letter). Parents are welcome to attend and stay in the dormitories at a cost of \$150.00, including meals and insurance. Campers are welcome to bring snacks, drinks, etc...

There is no room for stalling additional horses, so a stall fee of \$25.00 will be charged for each additional horse a participant or parent brings so we can locate or set up additional space.

HORSE RULE - All horses brought to the roping school must have had a Negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test within the past 12 months. An accredited veterinarian can take care of the testing procedures and provide you with a VS 10-11, EIA test form. You must have with you on arrival at the 4-H Team Roping School a copy of the VS 10-11 form for every horse you bring to the school.

To complete the registration process, please fill out, sign, and mail Attachments I (Registration Form), II (Authorization for Medical Care), III (Rules for Participants), IV (Code of Conduct), and VS 10-11 Form. You are encouraged to make a copy of Attachment III so you know what to bring with you to school.

This is a roping *school*, not a roping. Participants must be willing to learn -- not just have fun. Instruction during the school will consist of six instructors to work with participants divided up into beginner, intermediate, advanced skill levels to teach the following topics:

1. Rope selection and care
2. Bits and biting for individual horses
3. Horse care at home and when traveling
4. Basic rope handling and ground work
5. Horse position for training
6. Ways to improve speed of competitive runs
7. Mental preparation for competition

Participants attending this school will show due-respect to instructors and chaperones at all times or they will be promptly excused from the school. Once again, this is an educational activity -- not just another roping and those not interested in learning and improving their roping skills need not attend.

Participants will be given the opportunity to compete in a Grand Finale Roping on Sunday, June 26th starting at 11:00 a.m. Buckles will be given to the champion header and heeler in the skill-level divisions with other prizes. Caps, ropes, roping gloves, tack and t-shirts will be given for other placings. Parents are encouraged to attend and observe improvement in participants' roping skills.

RULES FOR PARTICIPANTS—4-H TEAM ROPING SCHOOL

LEVELLAND, TEXAS

June 23-26, 2011

1. Applicants should be 12 years of age and older and active 4-H club members who are willing to assist in developing a roping program in their home county.
2. Each participant will furnish his/her own horse, feed equipment and be responsible for the safekeeping of these items during the school. Participants need to bring a water hose, rake and shovel for stall care and a padlock for their tack room. Participants must keep stall and tack room clean or their \$25.00 stall deposit will not be refunded at the completion of the school.
3. The school will furnish meals, lodging, instruction, steers for practice and other equipment used by the entire group. Refreshments will be furnished, but participants are encouraged to bring extra spending money for vending machines or additional snacks.
4. When an application is submitted it is understood that, if accepted, the applicant will abide by the rules and respond to the supervision of those conducting the school.
5. Each application must be completed in full and signed by a parent or legal guardian. Participants will need to bring towels, personal toiletry items and linens for a twin bed.
6. Horses brought to the school should be experienced roping horses. It is not the purpose of this event to train green horses. Horses may be borrowed, leased or owned, but must be furnished by each participant. Any horse injured or in need of any other medical attention will be hauled to the veterinarian if school officials are unable to locate parents of the participant. All such veterinary bills will be paid by the participant and his/her family.
7. The attached Code of Conduct should be read and signed by participants and parents or legal guardian. The Code of Conduct will be strictly enforced.
8. Participants attending this school **will** show due-respect to instructors and chaperones at all times or **will** be promptly excused from the school. Once again, this is an educational event, not just another roping, and those not interested in learning and improving their roping skills need not attend.
9. There is no room for stalling additional horses, so a stall fee of \$25.00 will be charged for each additional horse a participant or parent brings so we can locate or set up additional space.
10. Contestants should arrive **before 5:00 p.m. on Thursday** and be prepared to leave no later than **3 p.m. on Sunday**.

ATTACHMENT IV CODE OF CONDUCT

4-H TEAM ROPING SCHOOL

LEVELLAND, TEXAS

WHAT IS EXPECTED OF YOU:

1. You are expected to attend all sessions that are part of the planned program. Inform a member of the professional Extension staff if you are not feeling well or have a schedule conflict.
2. You should participate enthusiastically in all activities and exhibit a courteous behavior at all times.
3. Observe hours established by the professional Extension staff and be in your room. You will be subject to room check and will be expected to remain in your room during the prescribed hours.
4. No boys will be allowed in the girls' rooms, nor will girls be allowed in the boys' rooms.
5. Dress appropriately for the occasion. Delegates should be courteous, clean and display good manners. Language must be controlled and appropriate for a 4-H member -- no swearing.
6. Except for planned tours and outings, delegates are not to leave the camp facilities any time without written permission from a member of the professional Extension staff in charge of the delegation.
7. No smoking during program events or in rooms, when it may be offensive to others, or in hazardous areas.
8. Participants will not use alcohol, drugs or be associated with or remain in the presence of others when they are being used.
9. No gambling involving money will be allowed -- This includes participants, parents, agents and instructors.
10. Avoid unnecessary roughness with people, furniture, equipment, etc. Occupants of a room or conveyance are financially responsible for any damage or results of misconduct. Respect the property of others.
11. No driving of vehicles at any time by participants. Keys will be taken up at registration and returned Sunday morning.
12. No riding in trailers with saddled horses when hauling from one arena to another.

WHAT VIOLATORS MAY EXPECT:

1. To have the opportunity to explain actions to the professional Extension staff in charge.
2. Behavior that is disruptive will be documented and a letter describing such will be sent to the County Extension Agent and parents of those involved.
3. Violation may result in dismissal and being sent home at parental expense (Parents will be contacted for agreement on arrangements).
4. If #8 is violated, youth will be sent home at the earliest convenience at parental expense. (Parents will be contacted for agreement on arrangements).
